Wow, a month and a half gone already! Guess time flies even when you're not having fun.

Weather Report

The arctic snow and ice storm ended Monday (22nd). It left 9 inches of snow topped with 1/2 inch of ice.

<u>Dry Campin – Not by Choice</u>

For me the storm was a real ordeal! First, I experienced 5 days with a frozen water pipe, surviving with bottled water. Interestingly the pipe thawed at 19°. I am assuming the problem is where the pipe comes into the house under the foundation. Apparently, it is not deep enough and/or lacks proper insulation. That, for sure, will be a spring fix!

Then once the pipe unfroze, I ended up with a clogged sewer line, which is actually a lot worse than not having running water. It took 6 days to get Roto-Rooter (\$470) out to unclog the line. The delay was a combination of lots of people with plumbing problems and bad road conditions. Finally, functioning toilets and my first shower in 11 days Monday (22nd) what a luxury!

Well, I made it through and now living back in the lap of luxury with running water and flowing sewer.

Credit to the Road Crews

I have to give credit to ODOT and the Wasco City Crew as they did a very good job of keeping the roads plowed! I also can say my truck did real good getting around! Actually, the hardest part was just getting out of the driveway, and for a couple of days out to the main road (Old 97) as the city didn't plow the local streets during the heaviest snow fall and after the freezing rain. They plowed the local roads Monday (22nd). They even cleared the entry to my driveway.

Tuesday was mostly sunny and warmed up to 45°. It rained off and on the rest of the month with temperatures in the mid-30s to mid-40°s, none below freezing. Even with the warmer temperatures (lower-30°s & mid-40s) and the rain, it's been a slow melt-off of the snow and ice, just not enough sunlight (heat).

Monday the 29th through the end of the month heavy fog (300' visibility) and cloud cover limited temperatures to under 50. With the ice capping the snow,

the snow slowly melted from the ground up. More rain after the 20th (.87") added 1.72 inches bringing the monthly total to 2.59 inches, plus 9

inches of snow. So, the higher amount of precipitation rate (El Nino) continues into 2024.

February started out with three days in the low 50°s, first for 2024, then dropped back to the low to mid-40s on Sunday and through the following week and a bit of rain Sunday night, Tuesday and Monday (.17").

Saturday (10th) the clouds cleared off, which dropped the morning temperature to 27°, but no significant wind. The high for the day was 51°. Real nice day! The warmer 50° weather continued through Tuesday, then it cooled off.

Wednesday morning started out at 28° with a light wind (5-7 mph). It got up to 38° then started to cool off about 3:00 PM and also started to Snow dropping about 1.5 inches. Most of the snow melted Thursday morning until about 3:30 PM, when the temperature dropped and it started snowing again, accumulating another 1.5 inches overnight. Most of the snow melted off by the end of day Friday, although it only got up to 36°. It only made it to 33° Saturday with a bit more snow in the evening, overnight, and continuing Sunday morning dropping about 2 inches.

Most of the snow was gone by February 3rd. However, some of the deeper snow drifts, and particularly the large, plowed piles were still hangin around February 18.

From October through February 18th total rain has been 6.52 inches, not counting snow. That is more than we had over the last 2 years combined.

Lunar New Year

February 10th is Lunar New Year. I guess the man in the moon has his own calendar. I'm not sure what significance this is. I guess it has more to do with agrarian societies, harvest moon, etc. Don't think it means much for the local wheat ranchers.

Slightly More Daylight

As the days slowly get longer it is nice to have daylight by 7:00 AM which extends after 5:00 PM. We are gaining a bit over 2 minutes per day. At this point we get about 10.5 hours of daylight. The Spring Equinox is March 21st when we hit the high of 12 hours of daylight.

I still don't think it is right that we only get two longest days of the year. But I guess that also means that we have two week each year that are longer than the others.

Participation as a Non-Rider – Odd but OK

I sold my bike just before I retired. I felt a little odd at the first campout I attended with no bike. But I soon realized bike, or no bike made little difference in my acceptance or enjoyment at rallies and campouts. Now I don't even think about not having a bike. Although I do miss the group rides. However, group rides can be done in a cage. The one thing I don't miss is riding in the rain and/or real cold weather. In those conditions I am very happy to be in a warm, dry cage.

Another difference is the ability to haul camping gear, etc. For sure my truck easily carries much more than my bike ever could. The added carrying capacity has been a real blessing, particularly for Tygh Valley, where I haul gear for camping for the group. When I was riding, I always had to arrange with fellow riders and/or riders who haul their bike by trailer to help me carry all the gear and supplies for Tygh Valley. Now that is no longer a problem. If you haven't caged it to a campout, try it, you might like it!

Fountain or Drain

Travis Kelce, Kanas City Chiefs, has been all over the internet lately for football and also his relationship with Taylor Swift. I'm not a big football fan anymore, but it been hard to avoid all the press coverage.

One thing that caught my attention was a comment Travis made about one of his younger day football coaches. His coach had called him into his office to discuss his performance. During the discussion his coach noted that he thought people fell into one of two categories: People tend to either be a Fountain or a Drain. What I have observed is that you tend to be a Drain. That statement resonated with Kelce and altered his career.

That statement also resonated with me. Thinking about it, I feel that at times I have fallen into both categories, as I suspect many of us have, without ever recognizing it. But now, having made the distinction, it will be more on my mind with an emphasis on leaning more towards being a Fountain rather than a Drain.
